

DRUGS TO AVOID

I have the Long QT Syndrome. This condition makes me susceptible to irregular heartbeats called *arrhythmias*. Many drugs are known to provoke life-threatening arrhythmias, others are suspected to carry that risk, and for many the risk is not known. Therefore, patients with Long QT Syndrome must use great caution when taking any medications, prescription, over-the-counter drugs, dietary and herbal supplements. Medications should be taken only when *absolutely necessary*.
